# **COVID-19 related travel updates**

(Updated on Mar 4, 2023)

### (A) COVID-19 measures

#### (I) Entering Hong Kong from an overseas place

Good news for travellers to Hong Kong! From March 1, 2023, the mask mandate (outdoor, indoor, public transport) has been lifted, except in medical facilities and residential care homes and disabilities the elderly people with to protect high-risk groups. (https://www.info.gov.hk/gia/general/202302/28/P2023022800677.htm). There are also **no** vaccination, no quarantine and no isolation requirements. Inbound travellers only need to conduct a rapid antigen test (RAT) within 24 hours (can be self-administered), or a polymerase chain reaction-based (PCR) nucleic acid test within 48 hours before scheduled time of flight departure, and keep the photo of test result for 90 days for inspection upon <u>request by Government personnel</u>. They may declare test result **voluntarily** via the electronic Health Declaration Form (https://www.chp.gov.hk/hdf/). Inbound travellers no longer have to take pre-departure or on-arrival nucleic acid tests. After arrival, they are recommended to conduct daily RATs between Day 0 (arrival day) and Day 5 and voluntarily declare the RAT result through the above electronic Health Declaration Form. The Vaccine Pass requirement to enter various premises has been lifted 29. from Dec 2022 onwards (https://www.info.gov.hk/gia/general/202212/28/P2022122800773.htm)

#### (II) Entering Mainland China/Macao from Hong Kong

- 1. Starting from February 6, 2023, normal travel between Hong Kong and the Mainland has fully resumed. There is no daily quota imposed in <u>ALL</u> Boundary Control Points (BCP) between Hong Kong and the Mainland, and there is no need to make an online booking.
- 2. For travellers from Hong Kong to the Mainland, if they <u>have stayed in any overseas places or Taiwan</u> on the day of departing Hong Kong for the Mainland or during the <u>seven days</u> before that <u>day</u>, they are required to present the following, except those aged three and below. They don't need to undergo quarantine in Mainland/Macao.
  - A negative result from a self-paid PCR test at Hong Kong's community testing centres/community testing stations (CTC/CTSs) (can be booked online https://www.communitytest.gov.hk/en/station/) private medical institutions or (www.coronavirus.gov.hk/pdf/List\_of\_recognised\_laboratories.pdf). The test specimen must be a throat swab, nasopharyngeal swab or combined nasal and throat swab collected by dedicated staff. Free community test will not be accepted for cross-boundary and outbound travel. The test must be taken within 48 hours before the scheduled flight departure time (for those entering the Mainland via airport) or arrival time (for those entering the Mainland via other boundary control points).

In addition to the various boundary control points outlined in the press release on January 5 (<a href="https://www.info.gov.hk/gia/general/202301/05/P2023010500649.htm">https://www.info.gov.hk/gia/general/202301/05/P2023010500649.htm</a>), the Lo Wu Control Point, the Lok Ma Chau/Huanggang Control Point and the Heung Yuen Wai/Liantang Control Point have been opened up for full passenger clearance services (including private car clearance services) from February 6 onwards. 4. From March 11, 2023 onwards, long-haul services of the Hong Kong Section of the Guangzhou-Shenzhen-Hong Kong Express Rail Link (XRL) will gradually resume. In the first phase, services between Hong Kong West Kowloon Station (WKS) and three stations, namely Chaoshan, Shantou and Zhaoqingdong, will resume. By taking long-haul trains on these routes, the public can reach 11 intermediate stations, namely Chaoyang, Foshanxi, Houmen, Huidong, Huizhounan, Kuitan, Lufeng, Puning, Sanshuinan, Shanwei and Shenzhen Pingshan. Starting from April 1, 2023, the long-haul services of the XRL Hong Kong Section will fully resume, connecting Hong Kong and long-haul destinations outside Guangdong Province. From March 11, 2023, the first train of the day travelling from WKS to Guangzhoudong Station will not serve two intermediate stations, namely Futian and Dongguan. The journey time is expected to be shortened by more than 10 minutes. The departure time of the first train from Guangzhounan Station to WKS will be advanced to 7.05 am and its arrival time will be advanced to 8.14 am accordingly. This will provide greater convenience to visitors travelling between Hong Kong and the Mainland. Please read:

## (B) Travel documents/visa requirements

**IMPORTANT:** Please check the number of visa-free days you have, or whether you need to apply for a proper visa, before flying to Hong Kong. For nationals of some countries, even making a transit on the airside of Hong Kong airport requires a visa.

For those intending to go to Mainland China/Macao via Hong Kong, please read Part II under (A) COVID-19 measures.

- 1. **Singapore** passport holders entering Hong Kong as a 'general visitor' are entitled to a visa-free period not exceeding 90 days.
- 2. **Vietnamese** and **Laos** passport holders have to apply for a proper visitor visa from Immigration Department's website. Please read: https://www.immd.gov.hk/eng/services/index.html#tab f 1
- 3. **Indian** passport holders are required to apply for and successfully complete pre-arrival registration (PAR) online before they can visit Hong Kong visa-free. Please read: https://www.immd.gov.hk/eng/services/visas/pre-arrival registration for indian nationals.html

4. **China nationals (ie PRC passport holders)** who are in <u>TRANSIT</u> through Hong Kong are entitled to 7-day visa-free days in Hong Kong. Arrival day is counted as Day 0. For example, if you arrive at 0800 hr on May 1, your permitted stay in Hong Kong is up to 2359 hr on May 8. "Transit" generally means travelling from country/territory A into Hong Kong, before leaving for country/territory B (for example, from Singapore to Hong Kong, then Mainland China; or from Singapore to Hong Kong, then Korea). Those travelling from one country to Hong Kong and then back to the **same country** (for example, from Singapore to Hong Kong and then back to Singapore) are **NOT** regarded as in transit. They need to apply for an entry permit for social and business visits to Hong Kong, <u>from the relevant Chinese Embassy or Consulate-General of their departure country</u>. For the contacts, see Point 5 of the section "Useful websites/contact numbers at a glance".

- 5. For **nationals of other countries**, please check "Part 2" of following Immigration Department website for the visa-free period (if any) and the visa requirements. For nationals of some countries, even making transits through Hong Kong airport on the airside still require a visa. - 6. Visitors should ensure that the activities they engage in Hong Kong fall within those permissible under the particular visa they have been granted. For further questions on whether an activity is allowed under a certain type of visa, please liaise with Immigration Department direct (contact see #8) as it is responsible for interpreting and executing the related immigration laws and visa.

- 7. If a longer stay in Hong Kong is required, please apply for extension of visa from Immigration Department. Generally speaking, you must depart Hong Kong before the expiry of limit of stay. If there is a special/urgent need to stay longer, you may apply online for extension of stay when your remaining limit of stay is 3 to 14 days, and when you are physically in Hong Kong. Applications will be considered on its own merits.
